Millennium High School

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School District and Community

Millennium High School is part of a three charter schools and a preschool complex ranging in grades Pre-Kindergarten to 12 referred to as the Tracy Learning Center. The total enrollment for 2021-22 is 1,285 students. Tracy is a diverse community of approximately 95,000 people centrally located to the San Francisco Bay Area and Sacramento. The ethnic makeup of our student population is: 52% Hispanic, 23% White, 9% Asian, 7% Black or African American, 5% Filipino, 1% Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, and 3% Two or More Races.

History

The Tracy Learning Center vision encompassed a continuous educational program for students PreK - 12. The focus is to present a new and fresh approach to education that would personalize the learning process and bring greater depth and understanding using technology, broad based curriculum planning and projects. The Tracy Learning Center began in 2001 with Discovery Charter School in grades 5 and 6 and progressed to include grades 7 and 8. Three years later, the Tracy Learning Center began Primary Charter School which now includes grades TK to 4, and Millennium High School. Primary Charter Preschool was added in 2015. With these expansions, the student body has grown from 75 students to over 1,200 students today.

Charter Status

The original charter for Discovery was approved by the Tracy Unified School District in 2001 and most recently renewed in July of 2021. The charter for Millennium High School was most recently renewed in 2019 by the same board for an additional five year term.

School

Millennium High School, the third school in the TK - 12 continuum, opened in 2004 with freshmen and added a class each year. For the 2021-2022 school year the enrollment is 531 students and a staff of 33 teachers, two counselors and a counseling assistant. The student to faculty ratio is 16:1. The school year is 205 days including a mandatory five week summer program. The focus of the high school is to fully prepare students for a successful life beyond high school which includes: academic preparation for higher education, career exploration including an internship, and a social commitment through a 200 hour community service requirement. *(Due to safety concerns regarding COVID-19, the physical internship and community service requirements were on hold and/or adjusted during our school campus closure from March 2020 to July 2021.)*

ACADEMICS: 2021 – 2022

We began the 2020-2021 school year in a fully online format, then in November 2020, 20% of students returned to campus for in-person learning, while students at home attended synchronous online classes, Monday through Thursday. Fridays were online and asynchronous for all students. In May 2021, our summer school program, Fast Track, began fully in person, as well as our Fall 2021 classes in August. There are three educational course sequences for students to follow that all lead to some form of higher education: Early College, College Prep, and Community College or Vocational Training preparation. Early College pathway students are expected to begin taking college classes by the summer of their tenth grade year. They gain experience learning in a college classroom environment. This pathway provides more time for college classes than the College Prep pathway which includes students who are following a more traditional college prep high school program. ***Millennium offers one AP and three Honors courses. We also encourage students showing academic excellence to take classes at a local community college through a reduced schedule in their junior and senior year and a scholarship for successfully completed coursework (B or better grade).*** Students earn 5 credits for passing each semester course at Millennium. They earn 10 elective credits for each community college course successfully completed, and receive a weighted grade included in their GPA. College prep courses have been approved by the University of California Articulation Department. Technology is used for research, presentations, and writing in all classrooms. Project based learning is part of all curriculum areas for all course sequences.

Grading/Class Rank

- Students must earn a C- or better in order to receive credit for a class
- D's & F's receive no credit and must be repeated
- Class rank is determined by the Grade Point Average (GPA) of all high school credit courses taken through fall semester of senior year.
- Millennium weights grades for honors classes and college courses
- All college courses are included on student transcripts and are factored into their GPA

COVID-19 Related Campus Closure Summary

- The Tracy Learning Center school campus was closed beginning on March 13, 2020, during the 2019-2020 school year.
- Millennium High School students began 2019-2020 Quarter 4 in a fully online, synchronous format starting on March 30, 2020.
- Students were graded on a traditional A-F scale for Spring 2020 Semester. Their semester grades were an average of their in-person Quarter 3 grade and their online Quarter 4 grade.
- Fast Track, our mandatory summer school program, was conducted completely online and synchronous for Summer of 2020, and students were graded on a traditional A-F scale. If students did not complete the course due to excessive absences, they received an NC “no credit” grade.
- The 2020-2021 school year began in a fully online format for all students. In November 2020 with a waiver approved by the San Joaquin Public Health Department, 20% of students returned to campus for in-person learning, while students at home attended synchronous online classes, Monday through Thursday. Fridays were online and asynchronous for all students. Community Service and physical Internship requirements are currently on hold and/or adjusted during business closures.
- Fast Track 2021 was held fully in-person, and the 2021-22 school year began fully in-person.

College Credit Earned

Students pursuing a more rigorous course load take advantage of the opportunity to attend classes at San Joaquin Delta Community College. Below is a table showing the average number of credits earned:
